NEW YORK, NY, December 21, 2009 - Ambassador Camillo M. Gonsalves, Permanent Representative of Saint Vincent and the Grenadines to the United Nations, expressed his disappointment over the Copenhagen Accord.

In unscripted remarks made during the meeting of the High Level Panel of Experts (HLPE) on the Copenhagen Accord, moderated by UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon and UN President Dr. Ali Abdullahi, Ambassador Gonsalves stated:

"The Accord is not legally binding, which, I assume, was an aim of most countries heading into Copenhagen. It is a political declaration, not a legally binding agreement."

"The Accord refers to a limit of 2°C [temperature rise above preindustrial levels], and there are a significant number of countries that are not included in the list of countries that are supposed to be included in the Accord."

Ambassador Gonsalves expressed skepticism regarding the pledge by developed countries to provide \$100 billion in aid to developing countries by 2012.

"These sums were proposed with regard to the comfort of developed countries' economies, not to the needs of the developing world."

Further, the Ambassador noted that the Accord, which was prepared by a small group of countries in an informal setting, is not representative of the views of the majority of countries.

Ambassador Gonsalves went on to criticise negotiating processes that marginalise the majority of the world's population, particularly the developing world.

Indicating that Saint Vincent and the Grenadines "feel[s] no less threatened today than we did when Copenhagen was held," he stated:

"We think that the credibility of the United Nations itself is going to be tested between now and the coming year. We are going to see whether the United Nations can deliver on its promise to be a more effective and credible organization."
